Maundy Thursday

Traditionally, the day remembers the Last Supper, Christ's washing of the disciples' feet, and the great mandate, which is where the name Maundy is derived.

To begin, the name 'Maundy' is derived from the Latin word 'mandatum', which means 'commandment'.

From the 13th chapter of the Gospel of St. John we get both the story of the washing of feet and the mandate:

“Now before the feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart out of this world to the Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. And during supper, when the devil had already put it into the heart of Judas Iscariot, Simon's son, to betray him, Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, rose from supper, laid aside his garments, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin, and began to wash the disciples' feet, and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter; and Peter said to him, 'Lord, do you wash my feet?' Jesus answered him, 'If I do not wash you, you have no part in me.' Simon Peter said to him, 'Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!' Jesus said to him, 'He who has bathed does not need to wash, except for his feet, but he is clean all over; and you are clean, but not all of you.' For he knew who was to betray him; that was why he said, 'You are not all clean.'”

When he had washed their feet, and taken his garments, and resumed his place, he said to them, 'Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord; and you are right, for so I am. If I then, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have given you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you.”

Towards the end of the chapter, Christ gives his disciples the mandate that gives Maundy Thursday its meaning:

“A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.”

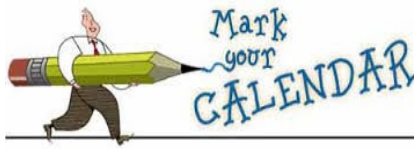

History

Memories of Hoge Memorial - by Nancy Loik

This has been a difficult article to write this month. There are so many things I've experienced, worked at and enjoyed. I wonder if our workers of today have time to do some of the neat things we did? In this writing I'm going to concentrate on the women's circles.

When I became involved there were three circles. Martha Circle which met in the evening because these women worked outside the home. Mary Naomi Circle was mainly retired women who could meet in the morning Rachel Circle also met in the morning. I visited each of the three and decided to join the Martha Circle because I was still teaching.

The women at Hoge have been such a rich, rewarding part of my time at Hoge in the late 80x and 1990s and early years of 2000.

It's so surprising to me that there was not a woman elder until 1967. Pauline McAllister, twice president of the Hoge Women's Association was the first. I did not know her but her husband was a teacher at West Junior high School when I was a student there in the early 1930's Women deacons came a year later (1968). Some committees were still male only when I started being active in the church in the late 1980's, Finance and Facilities for example.

My first new experience was being a circle member. I had never belonged to such a church group before. One of my first circle meetings was a Barbara Northrup's home. Pat Newman had retired and she and I attended our first circle meeting together. I knew Barb because she had been a neighbor across the alley before she moved to South Brinker Avenue. I knew Annabelle Ervin from West High School There were about six other women I didn't know who were in Martha Circle. Those whose names I remember are Martha Goff, Carol Ross, and Marinda Johnson. Later that year Pat, who volunteered at The Ohio Village and the Ohio History Museum (now called the Ohio Connection), had a woman who dressed in period costume tell us about Christmas in the early days of Ohio. It was not much of a holiday in those early times. That is the only time I remember going to someone's home for a circle meeting. Most Martha Circle meetings were held at the church on the second Tuesday of each month at 7:00pm. Eleanor Moore, Nancy Tharp, her daughter Judy Bosin, Barb Hensel, and Marinda Johnson. Later in the history of Martha Circle Barb Mapes and Jeni McGraw joined. After we became the only circle, Carolyn Colborn, Kay Moore, Patty Gorman and Joy Rector joined. After I had a pacemaker inserted in 2001 my circle members, who were able, came to my home a couple of times for meetings. In the early days we used lessons from The Horizon. We took turns doing lessons and we brought simple but yummy desserts. We were usually home by 9:00pm.

Before I was active in a circle I remember my surprise when Martha Goff called to ask if we needed food after my dad died (1969). This was very early in our membership and I was not active yet. I explained that we were such a small family but I could use some shopping and someone to stay at our home during the funeral. Martha and Annabel were so kind; that was really when I began to appreciate what the circle was all about.

I learned to see more of the working of circles. My friends Hazel and Margie (Mary Naomi Circle) said the best way to meet and know church members was in the kitchen. How true! There are lots of people who come to the kitchen on Sunday mornings, most to work, others to bring food, some talk. Martha Goff was our circle leader and also was a Professor at OSU in dietetics, etc. When we had very large meetings (several hundred from Presbyterian Women's Association) she would write cards with workers names and duties. That wasn't necessary on our usual Sundays but it sure simplified the big affairs. Patty Gorman was on of the workers who came early and was the last to leave. John Bosin Judy's husband, was the only one who knew how to use the dish washer. Without him we washed dishes in the sink. There were many jobs for women and men of different talent. Women decorated tables and set up food. Men often helped with the chairs and heavy moving. Most workers would try to finish so they could attend church but several stayed for last minute jobs. Sometimes I made the coffee. My son says my coffee is terrible, but Mr. Klee liked it. It's strong. He would ask who had mad the coffee, and if I had, then he would drink it. If not, he took tea.

As an only child and during the depression I was not encouraged to cook. Mom's kitchen was small. She had four or five sisters that all went to my grandma's and cooked on holidays. We cousins were not encouraged to help. So the kitchen at Hoge was a new experience. It was fun to see what was brought to share and being a part of the working group, how well everyone worked together.

Soon after I became more active I realized there were other organizations. Leaders of each circle and other committee members met once a month to plan programs for all members. The Fall Sale, Summer School, Peace School and other programs of the women and the church members were among the topics planned..

Those of you who grew up in a church with your family are fortunate and may not realize the things you have taken for granted. I have been a circle member for almost 36 years. I've seen different methods of leadership. It broadens ones thinking. I thank the friends and women who have taught me so much and still keep me n the loop as much as I am able.
