Joshua 14:11 - "So here I am today, eighty-five years old! . . . I'm just as vigorous to go out to battle now as I was then."

This past Memorial Day tornados caused a lot of damage in western Ohio. Church World Service provided 60 blankets, 60 hygiene kits, and 180 clean-up buckets to the Presbytery of Miami Valley to distribute. Church World Service prepares these things year around, so they are ready to respond when disaster hits. Each year in Ohio there is a Festival of Sharing where congregations and groups from all over the state bring kits and/or clean-up buckets. The items are loaded into a truck and taken to a CWS storage facility. This allows people to donate items without the cost of mailing them. We are collecting items to fill four clean-up buckets. The buckets will be in the Narthex beginning Sunday August 18th and you can sign up to bring the items that go in them. Monetary donations accepted as well, if you do not want to shop. History

Memories of Hoge Memorial - I am beginning this section of the newsletter, Nancy's Story-the growth of a deeply Christian lady, for a couple of reasons. 1) Nancy Loik was a very involved member of the church, very active on many fronts. She also encouraged many people into areas that they are now holding to keep Hoge as vibrant and mission oriented as possible. 2) I believe many of the things in her journal will bring back personal and Hoge/Hilltop historic memories for many of our members and/or their families. There are some minutia in it's writing but that only adds to the whole picture. It is my firm belief that Nancy was a Christian force to be reckoned with topped off with smiles, love for everyone she touched, and wisdom seemingly beyond the norm. Somethings that shouldn't be just put aside and forgotten. Hang on, here we go, from Nancy's original journal (with a little paraphrasing here and there from me for clarity).Nancy would ask you all to keep something like this for your families....she has asked members of different committees she was in to do just that. One of the many, many God given gifts she share (s/ed) with all of us.

My parents were married, June 26, 1920 in Columbus Ohio. Dad, Carl Heywood was 39 and mom, Ethel Welch, was 27. Dad had come to Ohio from Indiana after WWI. He lived in a rooming house on W. Broad Street which was almost across from the old fire house (17). His landlady was an aunt of Chet Wagner. He and his wife Delia were friends of my parents. (Side note:) Dad played Sax in a dance band at that time.

Mom had moved to Columbus with her mother, Mary Ellen, and grandmother, Regina Stedham Wood in 1919. They lived in grandma's house at 293 Midland. Aunt Lena lived on Hague Ave. At the end of the car line. Aunt Laura lived on the grounds of the Columbus State School.

My parents told grandma they were going to be married but (told) no one else. They went to a Methodist parsonage in East Columbus. Mom was married in a bright stripped dress. I think dad collected debits for Metropolitan Insurance Co. at that time. His area was around Starling Street near Vets Memorial (now). They lived for a while with Aunt Gladys and Uncle John on Clarendon Ave. Then when I was born, they rented a house on Wrexham, 269. Their next door neighbor was Mr. and Mrs. Leo Smith. They called them grandma.

I was born November 4, 1922 at home. I was a week late-mom's water broke a week before my birth. Dr. Whitehead gave mom and me both up. It was a difficult birth-I still have dents in my forehead from forceps. Side note: "twilight sleep" was the anesthetic used. One ear was almost torn off and a bad heart was another affect. Some lady stayed with us for a month to care for us. Mom always said from that time she lived on borrowed time. At Christmas that year Mom and the nurse fixed my first tree. They hid that fact since dad didn't think mom should be up and about. He was pleased later though. Mom nursed me until I was 18 months old. They were very fussy parents. I was told, they wouldn't let me cry for long. Dad walked the floor and carried me.

Two differences (from then to today)-Pediatricians (specialist's) came to the home and pregnant women did not go out in public (in those days). Even though I was an only child I grew up in a loving extended family.

(In Nancy's journal there is a photo of :) Four generations. Grandma Welch, Ethel and Great Grandma Regina along with Nancy Ellen. Oh...the (name) Ellen came from Mary Ellen, we had a great grandma, Nancy Hamilton Wood. (In the photo on this page of the journal)-This house was at Aunt Laura's (over 100 year old house) at (the) Institution for Feeble Minded as it was called until the 1940s. Aunt Laura, Uncle Dell, Aunt Jennie, Uncle Bert and Ethel all worked there.

(At this point in the Journal there are four pages of several old photos naming the people shown in them and notes such as "The whole family would take vacations together. These all in the 20s").

(Banana Peels...cont) Wart Remedy - At the end of each day, place a small piece of banana peel, pulp side down, on top of the wart and hold down with some medical tape. Remove in the morning and repeat for about two weeks. **Banana Itch Reliever** - Rub the inside of a banana peel over the rash to ditch the. **Ease Bruises with a Banana** - Just apply a piece of banana peel, flesh side down, to the bruise, cover with a bandage, and leave on overnight. By the morning, the bruise will have faded slightly. **Fertilize Your Plants** - Cut your banana peels into pieces and bury just on the soil for a treat your plants will love. **Substitute Shoe Polish** - Just rub the banana peel over your shoes, moist side down. Then buff with a soft cloth.
