Advent Calendar's begin on December 1 and mark the 24 days before Christmas. Today, most Advent calendars include paper doors that open to reveal an image, Bible verse, or piece of chocolate. The tradition dates to the mid-19th century, when German Protestants made chalk marks on doors or lit candles to count the days leading up to Christmas. Early calendars included the little doors that are a staple of most Advent calendars today. Dwight D. Eisenhower is often credited for the proliferation of the Advent calendar tradition in the United States. During his presidency, Eisenhower was photographed opening an Advent calendar with his grandchildren. The \$50,000 Advent Calendar was a 4-foot, Christmas-tree shaped structure carved from burr elm and walnut wood available through Harrods in 2007. The World's Largest Advent Calendar was built in 2007 at the St. Pancras train station in London. It measured 232 feet and 11 inches tall, and 75 feet and 5 inches wide. The Lego Advent Calendar-For several years, LEGO has produced an Advent calendar set, featuring figures or contractible accessories behind every numbered door.

Communion was served to (36) people on October 6th, 2019, Fall Sale made approximately \$1,300.00, Tom’s commissioning service was held on October 27th at 3:00 pm with a reception being held in Wold Hall. **Moderators/Pastoral Care Report:** Tom visited Lois Duey and gave her communion. History and Other Announcements

Memories of Hoge Memorial - More of Nancy's world. (cont. from the November 2019 issue)

Mom got a substitute teaching job when I was about 5 or 6 before I started school. Married women were not allowed to teach in public schools until much later. Her job became full time so she wanted me cared for during the day. She and dad couldn't (really) afford it but they paid my tuition to St. Joseph's Academy and bought me my uniforms of navy pleated skirts and white middie blouses. She had first asked Father Swartz at Al's for me to go there (with my friends) but they were too crowded. I hated St. Joseph's - I knew no one. The nuns were nice to me - I remember the principal especially. I cried from getting on the bus in the morning until I came home. I didn't tell my folks. I didn't have to go to chapel but Uncle Dell said I'd be a nun. This lasted about 6 weeks. I realized I disturbed class so spent most of the time in the office. I read then because (in class) I used flash cards with other children and ate the principal's candy (while I was in the office). We had fish every Friday. I did not eat fish. It looked like it was steamed (Ugh). I couldn't swallow it so one Friday one of the sisters got angry and told me I'd eat it next week. The next Friday morning I howled so loudly getting on the bus that my folks kept me home. Later the bus driver told my folks he'd never been so glad to have one taken out (off the bus). He said I'd cried every day.

Since 1932, State Auto Insurance downtown has set up the State Auto Christmas Display and Life-Sized Nativity that is open to the public. The nativity scene and story of Christmas is a tradition that is loved by many. The display will light up each night from December 3 through January 2, 2020. Fridays and Saturdays feature choir performances and hot chocolate.
