

- Adult Gloves / Mittens



History

Memories of Hoge Memorial - by Nancy Loik

Pastor Ed is ready for a vacation. Believe me, he is a very hard act to follow. His memory is fantastic and he is so good at checking his facts. This is a warning that mine is all memory (no fact checking) and may not be in chronological order. I thought we joined Hoge in 1965 but this morning I called Roger Gorman to see how all was going and he said his family joined in 1968. He had a picture that we were in. It was the same class. How fortunate.

We came back to a very different Hilltop and Columbus in August 1959. It was a big decision for us. My husband was the son of immigrants and had not known his grandparents. He felt strongly that our children should know my parents. He resigned his civil service position to come. I was happy in California. But time proved him right.

The small town atmosphere was gone. Everything was west. It was hard to realize how west Columbus had moved so quickly. Two large factories were here now, GM and Westinghouse along with other smaller businesses. All that space had been farmland twenty years ago. The church led the way. Hoge had moved from Eureka to west of Hague Avenue. Glenwood Methodist had moved in at Valleyview and Parkview Methodist church was completed on Algonquin Avenue. There were some new schools along with some that had been there earlier. Oh, and the shopping center. Remember Wonders of the World at Great Western Shopping Center?

More of the historic homes were gone. I think there were three movie theaters now, the Rivoli, the Ritz and the Westmont. The Westgate neighborhood was filling vacant lots. Children in Franklin County attended Columbus schools. Soon there was a new school district, Southwestern City Schools, that became one of the largest in Ohio.

There is one thing I want to say before we go too far. This happened on one of our train trips back east. We came back to visit every other year. I can't remember whether we changed at St. Louis or Chicago. When we left the western train to come to Columbus, the Pullman Porter, knowing our destination, asked if we knew Mr. Sensenbrenner. I knew who he was but didn't know him personally. He told us "He is the finest man I ever met." Rev. Ed's father put Hoge and Columbus on the National scene. Years later, on my 90th birthday, I met Rev. Ed. There's an expression "fruit doesn't fall far from the tree." My friend, Hazel Marx a long time member of Hoge talked of him. He graduated from West High School ten years after I. We knew many of the same families but had never met. I'll confess we talked too long that first Sunday and ruined his schedule that day. It was like I'd known him all my life.

Readers may remember in my earlier writings that we joined a Methodist church in San Jose. I never saw a Presbyterian church there at that time. The minister was so excited to meet a family from the Bible Belt. I never thought about Ohio that way. California had been settled by Catholics. I believe there were ten or twelve missions there. Priests traveled with explorers.

We transferred our membership to Parkview Methodist when we returned to Columbus. We stayed there for four or five years.

I had been working at West Franklin School and Hazel Marx and Marguerite Frede became close friends. They were both active at Hoge. Hazel told me she came to Columbus after the war. She asked which church had the best Sunday School for her two young sons and was told it was Hoge. That would have been when Mrs. Sensenbrenner had classes and her husband had Sunday School classes. Hazel was very happy there. It was important to her and George for the rest of their lives. Their son, Lowell, a retired Army officer still comes back for funerals. I know because he brings me when he is in town. We came to Hoge after that. I was not very active at Hoge until my daughter graduated from West High in June 1970.

Roger Gorman was our mail man when we moved to Huron in 1960. He and his family had moved here after living in Arizona.

Unique uses of WD40: 1. Make a spade dig faster; 2. Quickly remove crayon from walls; 3. Remove tea stains from a kitchen counter; 4. Shine the leaves of **plastic** plant; 5. Remove blue ink from stained jeans; 6. Clean dog dirt from trainers; 7. Remove adhesive price tags from plastic CD/DVD cases; 8. Clean off chewing gum; 9. Clean your hairbrush, WD-40 unclogs matted hair from hair brushes. 10. Waterproof your shoes; 11. Free stuck LEGO blocks; 12. Remove toothpaste stains; 13. Clean a clogged inkjet nozzle - This one is a bit controversial (and as a rule we don't suggest using WD-40 on electrical products because of the residue). But if you're careful a tiny blast of WD-40 can unstick a clogged inkjet. It's worth doing on a cheap, old printer that you might otherwise throw away; 14. Remove candle-wax or glue;

WD40 cont.-15. Spray on trees to prevent beavers from chewing; 16. Clean dead insects from car; 17. Prevent mildew growth outdoors; 18. Stop wasps from nesting; 19. Clean bathroom tiles; 20. Protect a bird feeder from squirrels, make sure the bird feeder doesn't have food in it when you spray; 21. Remove oil spot from driveway; 22. Keep a lawn mower grass free, spray the underneath; 23. WD-40 is a great slug and snail repellent, spray the outside of the pot with WD-40 and it will keep the crawlers away. 24. Keep spiders out of your shed, not recommended for indoor use because of the fumes; 25. Spray chalk lines to keep them from washing away; 26. Remove stuck rings from fingers; 27. Remove glue from hands; 28. Loosen stuck zippers, be careful to spray the zip and not the clothing; 28. Shine surfaces for stock photography; 28. Remove old duct tape, by spraying it with WD-40; 29. Clean off car sticker residue. (WD-40 is a solvent)
