In September 1774, the first Congress of the American colonies was convened to address the refusal of King George III and the British Parliament to grant to the American colonists their rights as British citizens. At this Congress and the one that followed, no talk of separation from Britain was entertained. The question was one of how to secure the rights that were theirs under English law. A Second Continental Congress assembled in May 1775. This Congress made provision for a temporary general government, an army, and appointed George Washington as commander-in-chief of the army. Still, they did not seek separation from England, but only to secure their rights as British citizens. With rising tensions, King George sent German mercenary troops to the colonies to silence the voices of dissent. In June of 1776 at another Congress of the colonies, Richard Henry Lee of Virginia offered a resolution that all allegiance of the colonies to British government be terminated. The proposition was entertained by the Congress, and a committee consisting of Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman, and Robert R. Livingston was established. The draft of the Declaration of Independence was composed by Jefferson, and after a few verbal alterations by Benjamin Franklin and John Adams, was submitted to Congress on the twenty-eighth day of June. On July first, Congress took up the draft, and after several amendments were made, nine colonies voted for independence. Maryland and Pennsylvania refused to accept the draft, but after conventions of the people were called, majorities were received in favor of the Declaration, and the thirteen colonies were declared free and independent of the government of Britain. On July 4, only the president of the Congress, John Hancock, signed the Declaration of Independence, and with his name alone initially was sent forth to the world. Nearly one month later, on August 2, it was signed by the remaining fifty-six signers, with the exception of one representative. The final signer was Matthew Thornton who took his seat in the Congress in November and asked for the privilege of signing it. Special attention should be given to the influence of Christians upon the rise of America as an independent nation. It is not possible to fully develop this influence in the space allotted for this article. However, it may briefly be mentioned that the president of the Congress, John Hancock, was the grandson and son of Christian ministers. All except two or three of the signers of the Declaration of Independence were part of Christian churches. Perhaps the following quotations will demonstrate the Christian influence behind the American Revolution.



### **Benjamin Franklin:**

History will also afford frequent opportunities of showing the necessity of a public religion ... and the excellency of the Christian religion above all others, ancient and modern.

### **John Hancock:**

Sensible of the importance of Christian piety and virtue to the order and happiness of a state, I cannot but earnestly commend to you every measure for their support and encouragement. ... The very existence of the republics ... depend much upon the public institutions of religion.

### **John Quincy Adams, son of John Adams and sixth president:**

“The highest glory of the American Revolution was this: it connected, in one indissoluble bond, the principles of civil government with the principles of Christianity. From the day of the Declaration ... they (the American people) were bound by the laws of God, which they all, and by the laws of the Gospel, which they nearly all, acknowledged as the rules of their conduct.”

# History

## **Memories of Hoge Memorial - Excerpt from Booklet "Women of Faith 1907—1954"**

(Early) History of the Fall Sale-The Fall Sale has a long and varied history. A record has been located of a "Book Fair" held November 3 and 4 in 1961. We believe this was the beginning of a fund raising event for the Women of Hoge. Records show that Lois Pitt organized the 1961 Book Fair and the two morning circles were involved. Again in 1962 and 1963 a Book fair was held. In November 1964 a Book Fair and Cookie Sale was noted. Mary and Naomi Circles sponsored a Rummage Sale in 1965. Naomi Circle held Book Fairs in 1966 and 1967 and a Book Fair and White Elephant Sale in 1968.

A Bazaar was held in 1970 and in 1971 along with the Bazaar, a garden shop, baked goods, books, a Christmas shop, fish pond and novelties were included. A luncheon and a turkey dinner was held. Records show that Delores Kenard was the coordinator. Martha Merriman Cushman chaired a rummage sale, snack bar, clothing, books, toys, and household items for "Bargain Days" in 1972. Barbara Northrup was involved in planning a "Craft Day" in 1973. Those attending made crafts for a fee. "Hodge Podge Days" was planned by Mary-Naomi Circle in 1974 and 1975. Featured were books, fleas, and baked goods. In 1978 Mary-Naomi held a "Whale of a Sale" on September 29 and 30. Rebecca Circle served a lunch. In 1979 they held a fall sale again in September and asked for help. That year they had fleas, books, clothing, plants, crafts and baked goods. Total profit was over \$1300. Mother's Club served lunch and made over \$100.

Catherine Zulauf was chair in 1980. The Fall Sale continued in the 1980s and dates of the first Friday and Saturday in October were established as sale days. This became the tradition and the community knew that was when it would be. In 1984 it was noted that set-up day was Thursday, October 4 with men being asked to help. Catherine and Ruby Capps organized workers and times. On Friday, ours were 9am to 6pm and 9 to noon on Saturday. Items were one-half price on Saturday in the flea market and clothing was sold by the bag. Ruby and Catherine were coordinators during those years.

By the mid-1980s, the Fall Sale had grown beyond the scope of two circles and the whole association was involved. In 1985 the Executive Board of the Women's Association approved having the Fall Sale October 4 and 5 with the collection of items starting in April. The poster advertising the sale was designed by Evan Morris on the computer. Catherine Zulauf was coordinator. The following chaired the departments: Publicity, Martha Goff; Clothing, Ruby Capps; Flea Market, Ruth Nash; Jewelry, Marguerite Freda; Bake Sale, Evelyn Decker; Books, Martha Pack. The Sale made \$1888. From time to time chairs of departments changed but these departments continued with toys and games being included in the book department and accessories included in jewelry. The hours of the sale changed to 9am to 3pm on both Friday and Saturday. After the sale closed on Saturday the "leftovers" were packed in boxes and stacked awaiting pick-up by charitable organization. Several men helped on set-up day, during the sale and clean-up.

Marge Kennedy coordinated the sale from the 1990s for several years. The sale continued to grow. In 1989 soup was sold and in 1990 a lunch room was opened in the kitchenette from 11am to 1pm. This eventually became the "Diner" which was open longer and with more items to choose from. The bakery and diner delivered a lunch order to a Hilltop school for several years. Books were donated to libraries. One year, Pat Newman, head of publicity, was heard on a local radio show in the morning of a sale day. In 1999 receipts from the sale reached over \$6,000.

In the last few years a "paid ad" has been placed in the weekly neighborhood paper. Posters continue to be placed in local stores, laundromats and libraries. Work days still begin in the early summer with many Hoge women and men participating.

Originally this sale was one project of two circles to help raise funds. Some other projects of circles have included everything from selling items such as, brooms, napkins and pocket calendars to holding games parties and armchair bazaars and the recycling of aluminum cans. In the past the Women's Association sponsored many events which the members participated in, including testing products and hosting Big Bear luncheons. The women who held the book fairs in the early sixties never dreamed that it was the beginning of what would evolve into the major fund raising event for the Presbyterian Women in Hoge for many years.

(As of the writing of the booklet:) In the past decade this event helped fund missions of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and regional and local mission opportunities. Also it helped the Presbyterian Women in Hoge support and provide improvements for our church. Some of these were: carpet in the sanctuary, blinds in Wold Hall, paint and blinds in the kitchenette, junior and primary rooms, fixtures in the ladies restrooms, contributions toward the office copier and improvements at the manse. Donations from everyone and the time and hard work of many continued to make the Fall sale a profitable venture.

At this point in time, Donna Swaneck is working to revive this money making event.

**Ways to use a muffin tin** other than bake muffins— Pre-scooped ice cream into each hole with a cup cake wrapper; Use them to hold pepper shells for stuffed peppers; Can be used to organize and carry condiments, each cup with catsup, mustard, chopped onions, chopped tomatoes, etc.; Make lemon ice cubes for those hot summer days or just extra large ice cubes; Repurpose it into a drawer organizer for paper clips, rubber bands, etc.; Even use it as the perfect garden planting grid...turn upside down and press into soil as markers for where to plant; Hash Brown Cups Toss 1 pound shredded Yukon Gold potatoes with 4 tablespoons melted butter, 1/2 teaspoon kosher salt and some pepper. Press into a cup shape in 12 oiled muffin cups. Bake at 400 degrees F until browned and crisp, 45 to 50 minutes. Fill with scrambled eggs. (cont. ahead)

Lasagna Cups Layer your lasagnas and bake them using a muffin pan; Chocolate Bowl, Edible chocolate bowls to server dessert, fill your muffin trays with melted chocolate and invert them to remove the excess chocolate. Refrigerate for at least 20-30 minutes and De-mold them carefully, making sure they don't break; Pizza bites, Bite-sized pizzas bursting with cheese, bread cheese and sauce; Dips, serving 'chips and dips', instead of using 5-6 different bowls for serving dip. Use each muffin space to fill different kinds of dips like mustard, mayonnaise, guacamole, salsa, etc, Use it as a pretty votive candle holder, Try it as a center piece at your next dinner party. You could even add water into each section and add floating candles.</p>
