Stop To Salute On Memorial Day

EAGLE BASE, Bosnia and Herzegovina -- It was raining "cats and dogs" and I was late for physical training.

Traffic was backed up at Fort Campbell, Ky., and was moving way too slowly. I was probably going to be late and I was growing more and more impatient.

The pace slowed almost to a standstill as I passed Memorial Grove, the site built to honor the soldiers who died in the Gander airplane crash, the worst redeployment accident in the history of the 101st Airborne Division (Air Assault).

Because it was close to Memorial Day, a small American flag had been placed in the ground next to each soldier's memorial plaque.

My concern at the time, however, was getting past the bottleneck, getting out of the rain and getting to PT on time.

All of a sudden, infuriatingly, just as the traffic was getting started again, the car in front of me stopped.

A soldier, a private of course, jumped out in the pouring rain and ran over toward the grove.

I couldn't believe it! This knucklehead was holding up everyone for who knows what kind of prank. Horns were honking.

I waited to see the butt-chewing that I wanted him to get for making me late.

He was getting soaked to the skin. His BDUs were plastered to his frame. I watched-as he ran up to one of the memorial plaques, picked up the small American flag that had fallen to the ground in the wind and the rain, and set it upright again.

Then, slowly, he came to attention, saluted, ran back to his car, and drove off.

I'll never forget that incident. That soldier, whose name I will never know, taught me more about duty, honor, and respect than a hundred books or a thousand lectures.

That simple salute -- that single act of honoring his fallen brother and his flag --

encapsulated all the Army values in one gesture for me. It said, "I will never forget. I will keep the faith. I will finish the mission. I am an American soldier."

I thank God for examples like that.

And on this Memorial Day, I will remember all those who paid the ultimate price for my freedom, and one private, soaked to the skin, who honored them.

History

Memories of Hoge Memorial - Session and Circles by Nancy Loik

One Sunday after I joined Hoge Presbyterian Church, Evelyn Decker asked me if I would be on Session. We had known one another for a long time. Honestly, I did not know what Session was! She explained that it was the governing body of the church and she added, "we need people who will speak up."

My first position on Session was as an assistant to Anne Hostetter who chaired the Personnel Committee. After several meetings Anne was given another committee to chair; I don't recall the name. She asked if I would chair it for her. This committee probably had something to do with stewardship. It was a group made up of all men. They were kind and helpful. Sadly, I remember only three of their names, Mr. Drake, Mr. Neibert and a young son in the Dooer family. Our committee revised the pages of our church directory, which at the time included about 200 families. This meant every family needed to be called. No one wanted to sit and do it at church. So, we decided to make our calls from our homes and to complete this task before our next meeting. Everyone followed through on their commitment and the new directory was ready to go at our next meeting! I always appreciated that group. They were kind and efficient.

Even before there were circles at Hoge the women were active. Later the worked with other local Presbyterian churches. The history is quite interesting but it is before my time and others may know more about that time. One big thing that happened during my time, was the Reunification of the Presbyterian Church. It had been divided since the Civil War into northern and southern groups. Together the groups worked on the reunification for several years, planning and finally spending the final year putting the plan into action. Each group had its own customs and goals. Their first shared gathering was a Purdue University in 1988. More of this another month.

Monthly circle meetings did not occur in the summer months, but everyone pitched in to continue the activities of the church. The fa.. Sale, held the first weekend in October was the biggest money making project of the year. We spent time sorting, pricing and setting up. Another event was planning and having some form of Vacation Bible School. We continued to be involved in the work of the church, keeping attendance records, planning and preparing the coffee and donuts between services, ushering and preparing communion.

The women at church had a coordinating team of elected officials and circle leaders who met monthly. In my early years we met on a weekday afternoon because most members were retired. Later we met on Sunday mornings before church services.

I enjoyed the two or three times a year when all the women of the church could meet together for special Saturdays. These were days of honor, plan, entertainment and lovely lunches together. A brief description of one of the meet-

ings follows. In the morning it was business. New officers were installed, a short memorial for our members who had died the past year was held as well as discussion of future plans. Every third year we were reminded of an international meeting After lunch one year Anne Hostetter, who had worked at the YWCA for years, had a talented group of young girls give a fabulous program demonstrating double-Dutch. The last thing on the program was awarding honorary lifetime membership to a woman who contributed to the church. Usually this was given to an older person. I chaired this event in 2004. A small, closed committee selected three outstanding women. They were: Patti Gorman, Debra Peters and Donna Swanack. Their names were kept secret until the presentation. This is the last year I could find



recorded information for this award at our church. Thankfully these three ladies are still with us and still very active in the church. Each person honored was given a sterling silver pin. Our organization sent their names, a brief notation of their contributions and \$50 per person to buy each pin to central office.

A few days ago I received my March/April 2019 edition of Horizons magazine. There was a section titled, 2018 Honorary Life Membership Recipients. The program "....honors individuals' faithful service to the women's organization and the church." There must be at least 800 names, a few of which are men, who received the honor last year. Something else that surprised me was the increased cost of the pins. A sterling silver pin is now worth \$95 and a gold one is \$250. "The funds received through this program fund leadership development opportunities for tomorrow's leaders!"

Next month I hope to tell about the International meetings I have attended, three of the women who have influenced me and different roles of leadership. who have taught me so much and still keep me in the loop as much as I am able.

Cherry Cola Salad-2 small cokes, 2 pkg. Cherry Jell-O, 1 pkg. plain Knox gelatin. 1 (No. 2) can crushed pineapple, 1 (No. 2) can black cherries, 1 (8 oz) pkg cream cheese, 1 c. pecans. Take 1 cup juice from the cherries and 1 cup from the pineapple. Heat to boiling and mix with the Jell-O. Add all ingredients together and chill. 8. Ant Killer- put a teaspoon or two of the soap in a spray bottle full of water, mix it up by shaking it around, then spray any ants you see. 9. Flea Killer-use the same formulation as the ant killer above on furniture or carpet. Spray that on any flea-infested areas, let it sit for about 30 minutes, during which time it'll kill the fleas. Then you can vacuum up their remains. 10. Homemade Window Cleaner- a quart of water and 1 drop of Dawn in a spray bottle. Use this mixture like you would your usual window cleaner! 10. Keep Away Houseplant Bugs-a few drops of Dawn in a spray bottle filled with water, shake to mix it up, then spray your houseplants' leaves.11. Door Lubricant-An easy way to fix a squeaky door is with just a drop of Dawn! . 12. Make Your Own Ice Packs- get a gallon freezer bag, fill it with Dawn, then freeze it. 13. Safer Plastic Pool Cleaner-Dawn won't weaken the plastic on kiddie pools as bleach might, making this a great way to use Dawn dish soap!

13 Frugal Ways to Use Dawn Dish Soap 1. Weed Killer-A mixture of Dawn (1/2 teaspoon), salt (1/2 cup), and white cleaning vine-gar (1/2 gallon) can help keep weeds under control. 3. Concrete Safe Driveway De-Icer-gallon warm of hot water, 2 tablespoons of rubbing alcohol, and 2 teaspoons of Dawn in a bucket. 4. Toilet Unclogger- pour a cup of Dawn into toilet and let it sit for 15-20 minutes. pour a bucket of hot water into the toilet, holding it a few feet above the toilet (around the height of your waist). That should do the trick! 5. Grease Spill Cleaner-a grease spill cleaner in your garage or driveway. First, clean up the spill as well as you can (cat litter can easily absorb it). Then use a mixture of Dawn and warm water and scrub it onto the spot to clear up the rest of the spill! 7. Glasses Defogger- rub a drop of Dawn on each lens of your glasses, then wipe them clean (cont. on next line)
