# History

## Memories of Hoge Memorial - by Nancy Loik

(There is a photo of five young ladies in costumes at the bottom of this page:) In 4<sup>th</sup> grade we had a program. Our class did the *Minuet*. Mom made me a lovely costume. The top was lavender, the bottom lavender print. Angel hair had just hit the market - mom made me a gorgeous wig. Her hands and my neck didn't take to the spun glass.

Other games we played: Red Rover, Hide and Go Seek, Mother May I. We played every evening after school. In later elementary school after supper too.

Sometimes if we were starting something new - like fractions. The gang would come to our house, we had a black board in the breakfast room. Mom would go over it. The gang, Lois Noble, Trances Boyd, Dave Noble, Allen Grinstead and me. Mom also helped me with spelling. She said I spelled poorly and took after dad. Also in 4<sup>th</sup> grade I made my first real booklet on Ohio. I put it off until the last night. I remember setting at the card table in the living room Mom and dad went to bed. I got it done and got a good grade. I was a "putter offer" until I had children and going to university.

The gang would go to the Rivoli Theater on West Broad Street every Friday night. It would be a double feature .with news, cartoon and part of a serial. I had a crush on Hoot Gibson and later on Buck Jones. Usually one show was a cowboy and the other a mystery about Egypt or a civil war story, etc. Whatever, that next week we (Lois, Frankie and I) would have a club about the show Officers (I was usually leader). We'd have codes etc. The boys, Dave Darrel, Joe and Bob Cloar were the enemy. No one of us took lessons (music) or played on teams. We'd dress up and be in disguises - wonder what the neighbors thought. No one made fun of us - probably didn't pay attention. Halloween - we'd start (getting ready) first of October. We'd ring door bells, put leaves on porches, pin horns (prank). That lasted the whole month. We had parties but no beggars night. No one gave us anything but my grandma, she'd make donuts or cookies.

We had one pair of shoes for everything. No one wore jeans (overalls) or tennis shoes cause that meant you were poor. We were but didn't realize it. We almost lost our home-the bank was going to foreclose but mom wrote Franklin Roosevelt and FHA helped out. I can't convey how stark our lives were compared to now. But we had the best of times. We didn't have a lot of things. I saved up for roller skates, about \$2.98. That was such a treat. I couldn't afford a bike. We had fun and no fear of violence. I went all over the Hilltop often alone and at night sometimes coming home from the movies through the alleys. I was a little afraid. One birthday I asked for a pocket knife. I decorated telephone poles in the alleys and loved to check in trash cans too.

My favorite year at Highland was sixth grade. Miss Buckingham was fat. We called her Miss Buckingfacon but we all loved her. She read great stories, she stretched our imaginations, was fair, had a terrific sense of humor and she started me reading Richard Halliburton books-true adventure. I've always regretted not telling her how much she meant to me. She died when I was working in DC When I graduated from 6<sup>th</sup> grade I was the tallest in class. In 1<sup>st</sup> grade I was too tall to be a flower in the (class) play.

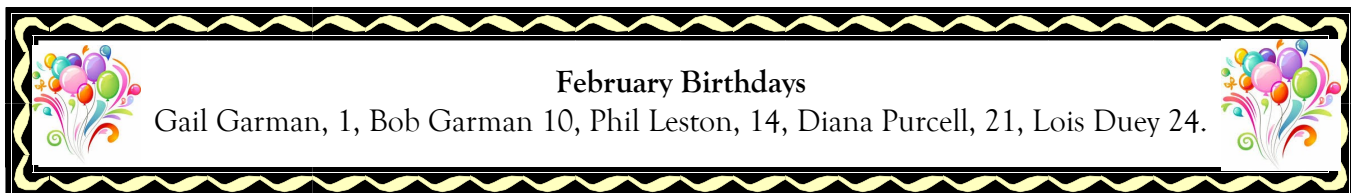
**Financial notes:**

**Improve ironing** - Line ironing board with aluminum foil. The foil will trap the heat and moisture. You can use to steam any wrinkles out. hover the iron about an inch or two over the garment and continually press the steam button. **Remove static from the dryer** - static-fighting qualities, aluminum foil. Make two or three balls of aluminum foil, about two to three inches in diameter, and toss them in with the load of wet clothes. **Sharpen scissors**-Try folding up a sheet of aluminum five or six times and cutting it with the scissors, sharpen the blades and extend the life of scissors. **Start a fire**- aluminum foil, cotton, and a AA battery. Cut a 4-inch (10.2-centimeter) strip of aluminum foil, about a half inch wide. In the center of the strip, cut away foil to make a thin, two millimeter-wide strip, approximately 3/4 inches long. (cont. from page 6) Wrap the thin connector in the middle with cotton, and attach each end of the foil strip to opposite ends of the AA battery. The cotton should quickly catch on fire, hopefully long enough to catch more kindling on fire. **Clean a grill, oven or pots and pans**-crumple up some aluminum foil. It probably won't work as well as something that's specifically meant to scrub and clean, but it will certainly work in a pinch. **Curl your hair**-Simply divide your hair into half-inch strands, roll upward from the ends, and wrap the curl with some aluminum foil. Clamp the foil with a hot straightening iron for just a few seconds, and remove the foil. **Catch cooking grease**-Line the bowl with aluminum foil, or form a makeshift bowl out of foil and pour into that. **Soften brown sugar clumps**-you could wrap the brick of hardened brown sugar in a piece of aluminum foil, place it in the oven at 300 degrees F for 5 minutes.
