### PASTOR TOM'S "LITTLE CORNER OF HOGE"

November 2024

Read Genesis 33: 1-11:

As soon as the words left my mouth, I regretted saying them! I shook with anger from our argument, but I knew I needed to apologize to my wife Linda, but I struggled to apologize because of my manly pride. In the Bible, in Genesis 33, Jacob overcame his pride – He had stolen his brother Esau's birth rite, and when saw Esau coming at him with an army of 400 men, he knew he was in trouble. Just like I knew I was in trouble with my wife after our argument. I needed to humble myself like Jacob did - He bowed 7 times, as did his maids, wives, and children. They all humbled themselves because they needed mercy, and now I needed mercy too. I sought out my wife Linda, grabbed both her hands, told her I was sorry about what I said and asked for her forgiveness. As tears glistened in Linda's eyes, I could tell I had touched her with my apology. She squeezed my hands and told me she forgave me – she knew I didn't mean to say those things through my anger, but I needed to let her know how I regretted saying them. To err is human, but asking for forgiveness is divine! This story in Genesis reminded me that God opposes the proud, but gives His grace to the humbled (1 Peter 5:5). I didn't bow to the ground in front of my wife, but I did release my heart and put what God wanted me to do above my pride. That mending a relationship requires humility, which can help us overcome our pride. You see, humility can help us reconcile broken relationships. We must rely on God's grace to stay humble. In our broken human pride, we want to maintain our superiority over others, so we chastise and criticize! Pray to our Lord, Jesus Christ, and ask for humility, so we can remain right sized and willing to offer forgiveness. After all, we are human and subject to remain loyal to our precious pride! May God grant us the humility to bring grace and reconciliation back into our lives! I hope you grace us with your presence and humility sometime during the upcoming holidays, because we miss you and love you! We pray this in the name of our risen Lord, Jesus Christ.... Amen!

#### Dr. Hoge Is Instrumental In Church Establishing

**Ohio's First Free Schools** In the early 1820's Dr. Hoge began to campaign for free public schools. He appeared before the legislature again and again to plead his case, and was aided by Cutler of Marietta, Gifford of Cincinnati and Atwater of Pickaway County. In 1825 the legislature passed a bill providing for funds from taxes for educational purposes. Two schools were opened in Columbus, one for advanced pupils and one for small children, and free public schools had a beginning in Columbus, largely through the work and influence of Dr. Hoge. Dr. Hoge also became interested in an experiment being tried in Hartford, Connecticut. Deaf people were being trained in a special school. He wanted these advantages for the deaf in Ohio. From 1824 he never ceased to work for that end. At last the legislature authorized Dr. Hoge to try the experiment with the Ohio deaf. As one legislature said, "I have no faith in the scheme but I have faith in Dr. Hoge."

In 1829 the first Ohio State School for the Deaf was opened in a rented room at the corner of Broad and High streets where the Deshler-Hilton Hotel now stands. The school grew until a permanent site became necessary. Dr. Hoge, Peter Sells and John McDowell offered to sell 10 acres of land for the nominal sum of \$300. This land became the location of the School for the Deaf located on Town Street. The first building was erected on this site in 1834. To learn more about the School for the Deaf he helped establish go to their website at www.ohioschoolforthedeaf.org. Dr. Hoge received many calls to other churches and was offered the professorship of theology at Hanover College in Indiana. He refused them all. In 1827, Miami University conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Divinity. For several years he was a trustee there as well as Ohio University in Athens. Dr. Hoge and President William McGuffey, author of McGuffey Readers were fast friends. Dr. Hoge was a great reader and a profound scholar. His knowledge of state craft was so great that lawyers and legislators of the state consulted him and his influence over legislation was such that much of the Ohio law at that time was affected by him. One eminent jurist of that day said; "I believe Dr. Hoge to be the best statesman in our commonwealth." Dr. Osman Hooper.

The following is a summary of Hoge's 2024 financial activity through September. Detailed financial reports are available by request to the church office. Hoge is grateful for the human and financial resources God has made available to allow personal and community-based ministries to remain alive and active during the start of another unique and challenging year. #### Designated Offerings / Donations / Other Income during 2024:

Buckeye Clinic support: \$266.60 (includes support for weekly lunches)

Building Enhancement & Improvements Funds: \$70,164.28 (includes interest earned from designated savings account)

Deacon's Funds: \$5,797.00 (includes 2/3 of Mission support from Worthington PC and early Fall Sale proceeds)

Ed & Lois Sensenbrenner Pastoral Care & Leadership Fund: \$230.79 (includes interest earned from designated savings account)

#### Financial notes:

We continue to address maintenance needs of the building and property:

Extensive tuckpointing work is being performed around most of the building (the building is now 70 years old and much of the mortar is deteriorating). In 2024, we have spent over \$54,000.00 on this project and we are about 3/4 around the building. While working through this project, we have the privilege of building our relationship with men from the Buckeye Clinic who get to see (along with the community) the outcome of their efforts and investment of time while working through their own journey of addiction recovery. The sustainability of our building for worship and outreach is dependent on this work.

We had slate roof repairs totaling \$6,000.00 earlier this year

We have estimated costs to replace and repair broken windows and screens throughout the building and exploring funding options

- We are looking at options for parking lot maintenance and repairs
- In June, we celebrated the tenure of Phil Leston as our Director of Music and Organist as he retired from Hoge. We are looking for a new Organist. We have hired a new Director of Music, please welcome Sam! We are also operating on volunteers for cleaning and maintenance of the building during 2024
- Our copier lease is up in October and we are exploring options for a new copier lease

Hoge receives support from a variety of sources; those sources believe the work of Christ is present here and its impact to the community is true to our mission of *Feeding the Community, Physically & Spiritually.* Your consistent support is appreciated.

The Finance & Facilities committee values your commitment to Hoge with time, talents and funds. Maintaining our building for worship, mission, safety, beauty and use in the community is something to be proud of. Contact members of the committee to inquire how you can help with our missions. Please continue to commit to Hoge in prayer, physical efforts, and financially.
