What is Trinity Sunday?

Everything you should know about the first Sunday after Pentecost.

Pentecost marks the end of the Easter season for Christians and commemorates the outpouring of the Holy Spirit on the early followers of Jesus. On Pentecost Sunday, Christians around the world celebrate this holy day, with symbols of flames, a dove and wind marked throughout churches. Though this holy day is not recognized by all Christians, the Pentecost was a monumental turning point in Christian history, considered by many to be the birthday of the church and is a watershed event in Christianity.

Trinity Sunday is the first Sunday after Pentecost to honor the Holy Trinity – the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. While the word “trinity” does not appear in Scripture, it is taught in Matthew 28:18-20 and 2 Corinthians 13:14 along with many other Bible passages. The concept of the Holy Trinity can never be completely understood. That is the mystery. But it is clearly taught in Scripture. Understanding this comes through the work of the Holy Spirit; therefore, it is appropriate that this mystery is celebrated the first Sunday after Pentecost, when the outpouring of the Holy Spirit first occurred. In order to better understand Trinity Sunday, you must first know Pentecost Sunday and why it is celebrated.

Before Jesus was crucified, He told the disciples that the Holy Spirit would come after Him. Jesus said: “And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Counselor to be with you forever – the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you. I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you” (John 14:16-18). Just as Jesus said, 40 days after the resurrection (10 days after He ascended into heaven), the promise was fulfilled when Peter and the early Church were in Jerusalem for Pentecost.

Many Christians recognize Pentecost as the birth, or the birthday of the church as it commemorates the establishment of the church as a result of the Apostles’ teachings on the gospel and the baptism of thousands of followers. Pentecost is when the Apostles went out among the people and began spreading Jesus’ message, thus establishing the beginning of the church. With the descent of the Holy Spirit, a New Covenant is inaugurated. It is one of the most ancient feasts in the Church, mentioned in the Acts of the Apostles (20:16) and Paul’s First Letter to the Corinthians.

On Trinity Sunday, the Christian Church ponders with joy and thanksgiving what the Father, Son and Holy Spirit have done to accomplish the salvation of sinful humanity. We remember the Father as our Creator, the Son as our Savior and the Holy Spirit as our Comforter.

Trinity Sunday is to explain, to the best of our ability, the clues written in Scripture to guide us to a fuller understanding of our triune God. The Father is God from the beginning (John 1:1). Jesus revealed Himself as equal to the Father in John 10:30, “I and the Father are one.” Together, they sent the Holy Spirit. The Bible tells us, “For there are three that bear record in Heaven, the Father, the Word and the Holy Spirit, and these three are one” (1 John 5:7-11). To understand the Trinity is to understand God more fully. By Lesli White

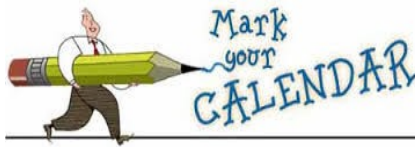

Updates and Reminders

Nancy's Memories

This may finish the first section of these musings-what the Hilltop was like as I was growing up. I've chosen to briefly talk about a few Presbyterian items before starting how the Hilltop changed when we moved back to Columbus in 1959.

Eleanor Wold and I graduated from OSU a day before D Day, June 6, 1944. I don't remember going to Hoge or seeing the Wold's after that. In the Spring of 1944. I had taken a civil service test and in August got two offers of jobs. One in Cleveland and one in Washington DC. I accepted the one in OPA (Office of Price Administration) in Washington. I was to report early in September. If my college years started my discovers, this next couple of years would really help one grow up.

I lived with 3 young women who were working in DC. Two were sisters from Columbus - I had never met them until my 1st day there. They had graduated from South High School and a friend of mine at college asked them if I could meet them. They were conservative Lutherans. I read a paper published by Marshal Field stating that this was a communist slant. Some weeks after I lived with them their mother and the wife of a Columbus judge came to visit. By then I was attending the New York Street Presbyterian Church every Sunday, my only day off. That church was called the Church of the Presidents. The renowned Peter Marshall was the head minister. He was also the Chaplin of the Senate. He was terrific. One Sunday the girls, their mother and her friend went with me to the Presbyterian Church and from that time all four (roommates) of us attended my church for as long as we were in Washington. A few months after I left the capital, I was maid-of-honor for my best friend, Lois Noble at that church. It was a small wedding and Dr. Marshall did not preside. I told Joy Rector about Peter Marshall and then learned more about Joy and her husband, Bill. While he was stationed at the Bethesda Naval Hospital, they attended a Presbyterian church in Rockville, Maryland. She also mentioned to me that a minister at Hoge reminded her very much of Peter Marshall, Rev. Calvin W. Didier.



Now I would like to talk about some of our members younger than those in the written about in our Women of Faith books but are long time members. A note Carol Ross wrote to me mentioned this. I have been in Martha Circle for almost 30 years with Carol. I supposed she had always been Presbyterian at Hoge. She said her mother moved from Franklinton. She lived near Hoge on Eureka when she was eight. She met Carolyn Decker at Hoge while they were in 3rd grade. She was her first friend. They both attended Highland Elementary. Their teacher, Miss Huston, was the same teacher I had in the early in the 1930's. Carol often walked to Carolyn's home on Midland Avenue and ate with them. The Deckers lived across the street from my parents home. When thinking back on that, I started thinking about the group that doesn't get mentioned often.

Another Hoge person that I've known - we both worked for Soutwestern Schools - is Dorothy Pemberton. Her mother, Mrs. Casteel, always sat near us at church. She and my husband had a thing going. If Alex nodded off she poked him awake. He did the same to her. She was from Vandalia, Ohio. Her husband lived on a near by farm. He was in WWI and her father's mother was a Quaker. She believed in education. I called Dorothy to ask when Dr. Wold left Hoge and talked about her life at Hoge. She and Warren graduated from West High in 1952 and were married by Dr. Wold in 1955. He baptized their first two children. The third by Rev. Didier.

Joby Whitehead's parents moved to Columbus from Pickway County near 5 Points and Darbydale. They moved to Columbus and she was born on Hamlet Ave. On May 26, 1932. Later they lived on Sutton and N. Huron. She met Ed at West High School and they graduated in 1951. Ed retired from OSU. I remember his faithfulness in his job at Hoge on the Finance and Facilities committee. Joby's mother, Lois Pitt was very active in women's affairs at Hoge.

Altha Martin was a member of Mary Naomi Circle for a least 20 years. She never joined Hoge but made friend and has supported it in many ways, many anonymously. She and her brother and his wife shared a double on North Huron Ave. for 40 years until their move to one floor condos in West Jefferson a few years ago. Her brother died several years ago. He didn't want her riding the bus to her old church. Altha took sewing classes in Jr. High and continued in high school. (cont. at bottom of page 5)

On graduation from South High School in 1948 Altha started working in Madison’s downtown. One of the older workers spent time teaching her how to do alterations. It’s different from working with a patterns. She was there 3 ½ years before going to Lazarus to work in the Wedgewood Room. She retired December 11, 1996 after 45 years. Her parents families were from two counties in Eastern Kentucky: Paintsville in Johnson Co. and Pelfry in Laurence Co. Her father was in WWI and her mothers father in the Philippines in the Spanish American War.

These families are and were the people who made up the Hilltop. There are more stories coming later.

TIPS: **Coffee grounds**, fertilizer/systemic pesticide non-toxic, sprinkle around your plants and windows; **White vinegar** substitute household cleaners (so called ‘General Purpose Cleaners’), cheap spray bottle and fill it with vinegar undiluted; Throw **lemon and orange peels** into the garbage disposal; **Meat tenderizer** gets blood out of clothing; **WD-40** removes crayon from ANYTHING, as well as scuffs from ceramic and wood floors; WD40 dissolves glues, spray WD40 where you ripped the sticker off; **Peanut butter** gets gum out of hair; Clean your mini blinds hanging spray with the **foaming bubbles used to clean sinks**. Use a garden hose or spray bottle to rinse; Put your celery in **aluminum foil**, it will last 3 to 4 weeks longer; Spray the inside of your **Jack-O-Lantern** with vinegar occasionally. It will last 10x longer; 1 or 2 **dryer sheets** in your vacuum cleaners air filter; **Old credit cards** make great scrapers.
