# AS IT WERE Hoge preached progressive ideas By ED LENTZ Monday July 20, 2015 4:09 PM

Virginia native James Hoge led the First Presbyterian Church in the early 1800s.

James Hoge was a man of almost endless energy and enthusiasm. The first minister in the first church in central Ohio, he was also an advocate of ideas that many of us take for granted today but which were considered in his day to be a bit ahead of their time. In the language of his own time,

he was a man who "cast a long shadow." Much of his story is the story of early Ohio and is worth retelling.

Hoge came from a long line of clergy, so it is not too surprising that he would eventually enter the ministry himself. Born on the Fourth of July in 1784 in Virginia, he was the son of one Moses Hoge D.D., who had served as an Army minister in the American Revolution. Young James Hoge was given a classical and theological education largely by his father and entered the ministry as a Presbyterian missionary in 1805. He undoubtedly could have stayed in the East. But like many young men of his generation, he had a restless desire to go west to the settlements on the moving frontier in what was then called the Ohio Country.

He set out for Lexington, Ky., in fall 1805 as a licensed Presbyterian missionary. Along the way, he stopped for the night in Wheeling in what was then still Virginia at the home of Andrew and Mary Woods. There he met their daughter Jane for the first time. He would marry Jane Woods five years later. Leaving Lexington, he arrived in Franklinton on Nov. 19, 1805. Franklinton had been founded in 1797 by Lucas Sullivant and was the first permanent settlement in central Ohio north of Chillicothe. A small village of mostly log houses, Franklinton was less than a day's ride from major settlements of American Indians. It was not a terribly elegant town in those days. For all of that, Hoge was heartily welcomed by Sarah Starling Sullivant, the wife of the founder of the town. Hoge preached the next day in a local home and stayed in town until April 1806, when he decided he had to return to Virginia. A persistent cough simply would not go away. He came very close to not making it back. Near Lewisburgh, Va., and alone on the trail, he began coughing up blood. Reaching a spring, he stopped to drink and collapsed. A local woman found him and nursed him until he was able to return home. After several months of recuperation and to the astonishment of his friends, he decided to return to Ohio in fall 1806. Hoge would stay in Ohio for the rest of his life. Despite his continuing frailty, Hoge was a man possessed of enormous personal drive and determination. He was constantly looking for ways to expand his congregation, which had formally organized as the First Presbyterian Church in February 1806.

For the first several years, the church met in private homes and later in the local courthouse. In 1811, Sullivant built a one-room brick church along the Scioto River. It was received with pleasure by Hoge and the congregation, but it did not last long. During the War of 1812, the building was used as a warehouse and filled from floor to ceiling with grain. During a rainstorm, the roof leaked, the grain expanded and the building literally exploded. A new building would not be built until the war ended in 1815. In the meantime, the entirely new capital city of Columbus was created on the Highbanks on the other side of the Scioto River. By 1814, services were being conducted there as well in a log house near the corner of Spring and Third streets. In 1821, the First Presbyterian Church of Columbus absorbed the Franklinton church and moved to a new site at the northeast corner of Front and Town streets. In 1830, the church would move to State and Third streets.

For more than 50 years, James and Jane Hoge tended to the needs of their growing congregation and were often at the head of movements to improve the community. Strong believers in the value of education, they urged the founding of schools to a population barely literate and not all that interested. Undeterred, they founded a Sunday school that also taught spelling and reading. It was not the first school in the area, but it became a popular one.

The Hoges also were advocates for public assistance to the blind, the deaf and the mentally ill and supported the creation of institutions in Columbus for their treatment. In the wake of a devastating cholera epidemic in 1835, Jane Hoge became the first president of the Columbus Female Benevolent Society, the oldest continuing charity in the city. In addition to all of these activities, the Hoges had 11 children, seven of whom lived to maturity. Jane Hoge died in 1861, one year after celebrating her 50th wedding anniversary. Her husband followed her two years later. They are buried in Green Lawn Cemetery.

#### New Flat Roof Topping for Hoge!!!

As many of you are aware, Hoge has dealt with considerable issues affiliated with leaks resulting from holes and problems with the flat roof. Over the years, we have repaired both sections of the roof and interior building damage due to multiple leaks. There have been considerable efforts to resolve these issues as they are discovered and minimize the cost of repairs. We are now at the point where the issue needs to again be addressed. The choir room, parlor and main upstairs hallways currently have signs of leaks.

The session has decided to that just patching the roof is not a viable option and roofers are no longer providing warranties with patch work due to the overall condition of the roof. We have the opportunity to have a new covering over the entire flat roof at a cost of approximately \$22,000. We currently have a commitment of funds totaling \$16,625 if the congregation can come up with the remaining costs. The work comes with a 20 year warranty on the materials and 5 year warranty on the labor. This is a compromise between a complete new roof (estimated cost between \$45,000 - \$60,0000) and on-going patching.
